Hello everyone! My name is Katherine Chang, and I am a junior in Lloyd and Avery. I've briefly summarized my objectives for Interhouse Committee Chair:

- · [Accountability] Ensure members of administration are held accountable to promises and commitments made over the year, especially those made under the premise of COVID-19.
- · [Funding] Protect the autonomy and availability of house dues; ensure the presence of student input in decisions regarding funding
- $\cdot$  [Housing] Ensure the roompicks procedure will revert to the pre-pandemic (2019) system with house-run picks models
- · [Rotation] Establish systematic student input in all aspects of the rotation process, from event scheduling to the algorithm; ensure there will be the regular pre-pandemic rotation scheduling and events for fall 2022 (assuming no unexpected complications)
- · [Culture] Emphasize the conservation of house culture; ensure continuation of interhouses, waited dinners, house traditions, and other yearly events from before the pandemic
- $\cdot$  [Security] Continue working on improving response protocol and training for security to property prioritize student safety

To begin, I am re-running to be IHC Chair to ensure a resolution occurs for a number of conversations the IHC was able to start regarding important House and student issues that have yet to be concluded under the caveat of COVID-19. Just as I have endeavored to do over the past year, I aim to protect the house system, promote the presence of student voices, and ultimately hold members of administration to their promised actions. During my past term, some things I have achieved include:

- · Making sure rotation occurred in the fall despite strong administrative insistence for a delayed winter rotation and negotiating the presence of in-person elements during a rotation that was initially only allowed to be fully virtual.
- · Initiating a commitment from the VPSA (Vice President of Student Affairs, Kevin Gilmartin) for implementing a systematic process for student involvement in all aspects of rotation (from event scheduling to the algorithm)
- · Establishing an agreement put in writing with Housing that the system used for roompicks in 2021 would be effective for only that year due to COVID-19, and that there would be a return to the pre-pandemic roompicks system in 2022

Additionally, I have maintained a working relationship with Felicia, Tom Mannion, Joe Bennethum, the VPSA, the Deans, and other administrators while consistently and assertively standing my ground on perspectives the IHC has decided on. There were promises made to and unfinished business from the past IHC that have been carried over, so as IHC Chair, I aim to ensure everything we have started will be followed through with and resolved in a manner which fully promote student interests.

[Accountability] Ensure members of administration are held accountable to promises and commitments made over the year, especially those made under the premise of COVID-19.

In many discussions over the past year, underlying complications faced by the IHC during negotiations were COVID-19 concerns and policy, where the primary justification for delays and decisions from administration were related to COVID-19. Consequently, a number of negotiations were incomplete and the IHC was promised follow-up discussions after COVID-19 became less of an immediate concern. Such topics include rotation, housing, interhouses and large events, alcohol policy, security protocol, and DEIA concerns. As IHC Chair, I intend to carry these conversations to completion, and I will hold the members of administration who promised a resolution accountable to their commitments.

# [Funding] Protect the autonomy and availability of house dues; ensure the presence of student input in decisions regarding funding

House control of their funding is important for self-governance and their ability to hold events as well as maintain house traditions. Historically, there have been regular efforts made by members of administration to centralize house dues within Caltech, further limiting the ability for houses to have autonomy over their dues and what they wish to do with them. Since funding is a critical component of the ability for the continuity of house culture, I aim to ensure the presence of student input on any modifications to the dues systems that administration may impose. Furthermore, I will continue to actively advocate for the importance of student input regarding all aspects of funding (dues, endowment, traditionally Tom Mannion-held events). Funding is very important, so I intend to continue advocating for house input and autonomy in any conversation regarding their money.

# [Housing] Ensure the roompicks procedure will revert to the pre-pandemic (2019) system with house-run picks models

Due to the delay of 2021 roompicks from COVID-19 pandemic-related reasons and dealing with an over-capacity number of students, roompicks last year ran much differently compared to previous years. The IHC negotiated as much house autonomy in house picks as possible during the 2021 roompicks and obtained a promise from Housing that the 2021 system would be effective for that year only. Thus, I aim to fully hold Housing to our agreement and ensure that the roompicks procedure for 2022 will follow similarly to the pre-pandemic (2019) system. Particularly, I intend to establish the ability for houses to independently run their own house picks. Roompicks are important to students, so I will make sure the procedure support student desires. I have a working relationship with Joe Bennethum, and I fully intend to leverage this to ensure house picks happen.

[Rotation] Establish systematic student input in all aspects of the rotation process, from event scheduling to the algorithm; ensure there will be the regular pre-pandemic rotation scheduling and events for fall 2022 (assuming no unexpected complications)

Historically, issues from rotation have often resulted directly from a lack of student input, particularly involving the rotation algorithm. Following a review of the last rotation and discussions with the IHC, the VPSA committed to implementing a systematic process which would promote student input and involvement in all aspects of rotation, from planning events to running the algorithm. Consequently, I aim to hold the VPSA to his commitment and ensure that there will be increased student involvement in the entire rotation process, especially pertaining to the rotation algorithm.

Additionally, I intend to advocate for a regular pre-pandemic rotation for fall 2023. Particularly, I aim to ensure that there will be house dinners at their regular times, evening desserts to further provide opportunities for students to casually interact with the houses, and house Big Events run to their full capacity. Barring unexpected complications out of our control, I aim for fall 2023 to be a normal rotation just as it had been held in 2019 and years prior. Since the class of 2023 will be the only class which have experienced a regular rotation, I will do everything within my ability to ensure a regular rotation can happen so that this important component of the Caltech experience will not become a relic of pre-pandemic times.

[Culture] Emphasize the conservation of house culture; ensure continuation of interhouses, waited dinners, house traditions, and other yearly events from before the pandemic

There are many elements of house culture which have yet to occur this year despite returning to campus due to COVID-19 guidelines such as interhouses, waited dinners, and certain house traditions. House culture is an outstanding element of the undergraduate experience for many students, so I intend to thoroughly continue advocating for these events to occur. The IHC has been actively negotiating for many of these traditions to occur over the past year, and I aim to continue doing so. Having negotiated with members of administration over multiple issues and obtained commitments to them that support student interests, I believe I will be able to

effectively work with the relevant administrators to bring these pre-pandemic traditions into the post-pandemic world by emphasizing the importance of these traditions while acknowledging and addressing the complications which arise. I truly believe in the importance of bringing back these critical components of house culture to promote their continuation in years beyond the pandemic, so I will continue advocating for their existence.

# [Security] Continue working on improving response protocol and training for security to property prioritize student safety

As a byproduct of the COVID-19 pandemic, security responsiveness to and familiarity with the houses has been inconsistent and led to concerning situations. Additionally, as restrictions loosen and larger events requiring security presence begin happening, it is important to ensure that security is properly trained and informed of how student systems (such as with Orange Watch and Health Advocates) function in order to properly prioritize student safety, especially during situations of emergency. Thus, I aim to continue working on developing protocols with administrators and Caltech Security that can work towards building trust and properly supporting students in any needed manner.




#### Hi Caltech Community!
